Income/Expense Statement Preparation

An Income/Expense Statement represents activities over a *Period of Time (POT)*, especially at the close of a fiscal year. Typically you will find the wording *For the fiscal year ending December 31, 19XX*, at the top of an Income/Expense Statement.

It presents the *Gross Income* - usually broken down by type of income, such as *Dues, Registration Fees*, etc., represented as **Total Income**. This "Grossing Up" of income is the formula for determination of the \$25,000 income factor which is the baseline for mandatory preparation of a Federal income tax return 990.

Next, Gross Expenses are listed - again by type of expense, such as Food Functions, Office Supplies, etc. - represented as Total Expense.

The Surplus/(Deficit) is then calculated by taking the difference between the two. The (Deficit) is normally presented in parentheses, which indicates a negative position.

In a Chapter's first year of operation, the Surplus/(Deficit) will (should) equal the Net Assets of the Chapter (see the Balance Sheet). However, in future years, the annual Surplus/(Deficit) will either increase or decrease the Net Assets (but not equal it).

Cash Position Statement

Generally, a Cash Position Statement shows an organization's Beginning Cash Balance, Sources of Cash (Income), Uses of Cash (Expenses), and the Ending Cash Balance.

However, it is also very important to record the cash items on a **Gross**, *not net*, **basis**. For example, if a Chapter receives a check in payment for sponsoring an event as its net share, the Chapter should actually record the check as **both** income and expense.

Several of your fellow Chapters have been kind enough to permit ASA to use their financial statements as samples to be enclosed with this mailing. All of the enclosed are Cash Statement Positions. I hope this memorandum, along with their statements, provides the assistance you need to prepare your Chapter's financial reports. I have also enclosed forms that you are free to use for reporting purposes to the ASA.

ASA Services to Chapters

- 1. <u>Administrative Services</u> that the headquarters office can provide for Chapters include:
 - o Collecting Chapter dues
 - O Providing four free sets of mailing labels and/or printouts annually
 - O Providing lists of ASA members in Chapter areas
- 2. The Chapter Officers Handbook is a resource guide for Chapter officers. It contains information about Chapter organization and management, the ASA office, and the Council of Chapters. A copy is provided to each Chapter officer.
- 3. The ASA Speakers List, first developed by the Council of Chapters in 1986, contains names of persons who are willing to speak at Chapter functions at minimal or no expense. A copy is provided to each Chapter President. Additional copies are available on request although supplies are limited. (Also see item 11 on the Visiting Lecturer Program.)
- 4. The <u>Chapter Visitation Program</u> is another resource for Chapters. Through this program, the ASA office arranges Chapter visits by ASA Board members and staff. These visits help to maintain vital links between Chapters, the ASA office, and the Council of Chapters. Funds for this program are limited, however, and requests are handled on a case-by-case basis according to Chapter health status and availability of funds.
- 5. LINK is a quarterly newsletter, devoted solely to news and features for and about Chapters. It is distributed from the ASA office based on input from Chapters and others interested in the Chapters. The mailing list includes Chapters officers, Board members, Council of Chapters and Council of Sections Governing Board members, and other interested persons. Contact the Council of Chapters Communications Officer and Editor of LINK, William C. Iwig, in care of the ASA office.
- 6. <u>Statistical Science: The Profession</u> is a 35 mm slide presentation on careers in statistics. The set of slides is available for purchase or rental by interested Chapters at a cost of \$65 or \$10 respectively. A small supply of the slide presentation on videotape is also available for \$50.

- 7. Amstat News, issued 11 times a year, is devoted to information of interest to the general membership. It is distributed to all ASA members. Notices about Chapter activities are included when information is provided to the Editor of Amstat News at the ASA office. (Also see item 5 on LINK.)
- 8. Quantitative Literacy Activities for Chapters—the Center for Statistical Education of ASA can provide quantitative literacy workshops for teachers in grades 7 to 12 that include new and modern statistical material and techniques that are transferrable to the classroom; speakers for the classrooms, career days, and national, local, and regional conferences; leadership in curriculum development; statisticians to judge science fairs and host field trips to business and industry; and various forms of national student competition such as poster, project, and scholastic contests.
- 9. A <u>videotape library</u> is maintained at the ASA office and is available for low-cost rental by Chapters. A series of interviews with distinguished statisticians was videotaped and can be used instead of a speaker at a Chapter meeting. Many ASA-sponsored short courses have also been videotaped and can be helpful in meeting the continuing education needs of chapter members.
- 10. <u>Membership recruitment aids</u> are available from the headquarters office such as:
 - o Brochures and pamphlets on statistics as a profession.
 - O Brochures for prospective ASA members
 - Sample copies of <u>The American Statistician</u> and <u>Stats</u>
 -the magazine for students in statistics
- 11. The <u>Visiting Lecturer Program</u> is sponsored by the Committee of Presidents of Statistical Societies (COPSS) of which ASA is a member. Although this program is intended primarily for colleges not having a major program in statistics, Chapters can benefit from the program by cooperation with an eligible institution. Further information on this program is available by contacting the ASA office. A listing of speakers in this program is also included in the ASA Speakers List referenced in item 3 above.

Introduction

This report presents results of the 1992 ASA survey of chapter activities. The purpose of this survey is to provide information on chapter activities, concerns, operations, membership, service needs, and utilization of the chapters, the Council of Chapters, and the national organization.

The survey questionnaire was mailed to the council representatives of each ASA chapter during the Spring of 1993. A few chapters returned two or more questionnaires, in which case the first one was used. The response rate was normal, with 73 chapters (96%) out of 76 active chapters responding. Albuquerque, Mid-Hudson, Montreal, and Southern Ontario chapters did not respond. Last year's data was used for these non-responding chapters with exception of Montreal chapter which did not respond in 1990 and 1991. In addition, three chapters, namely, New York Metro, NE New York and San Juaquin were reported as inactive. All three chapters were said to have had serious problems in being active for 1992. Table 1 outlines the response rates from recent years.

Membership

Total estimated membership differed slightly from estimates of recent years. An estimate of total membership for 1992 is 10,228¹ members. The minimum membership was 10 for the Mississippi chapter, and the maximum membership was 1190 for the Washington Statistical Society. Table 2 summarizes total estimated membership for the past six years.

25% of the chapters indicated that they used strategies other than the ones listed above. These strategies are listed below verbatim:

- sign-up sheets at seminars, committee meetings and short courses.
- Cleveland "free net" electronic bulletin board.
- monthly dinner meetings/annual conferences.
- direct mail for special events.
- departmental announcements ISU, Voice of Iowa.
- posting of meetings and special seminars.
- free membership to student award winners.
- letter of invitation to new state and federal employees and academics.
- invitation to join/chapter info sheet to IEEE, SME, ASQC, and local professionals.
- stat graduate student seminar re. benefits of ASA membership (given by a stat grad student who is a chapter officer), meeting announcements distributed widely, esp. at university of Washington. Anyone contacting us re. chapter activities is put on our mailing list for approx. 1/2 year.
- recruit through annual institute.

In addition, chapters were asked to indicate whether they contacted and/or recruited new members as a result of ASA's membership campaign in the past year. Of the 73 chapters responding, 34 (47%) indicated that they did. A total of 597 were contacted and/or recruited and, as a result, 118 (20%) new members joined ASA chapters.

Furthermore, 44% of the active responding chapters made some additional comments regarding the quality of services they received. Apart from the suggestions for improvement listed below, all comments indicated that the service received was either good or satisfactory. Following are the comments verbatim:

- Put affiliation questions (A2 A4 on this survey) on national enrollment form to help us collect these statistics for this survey.
- The quality has been good and our satisfaction level mostly good. The new member campaign, however, was less than successful.
- Our needs are local due largely to our geographical isolation.
- Chapter officers handbook, membership lists essential. Have used chapter visitation in past excellent. Another excellent non-course is corps grants for speakers.
- We get a lot of contacts from ASA that seem to be the Chicago, Dekalb, St. Louis coverage areas. Does ASA send multiple new member lists?
- We would like electronic access to national ASA database. Please send mailing labels along with the address lists that are periodically sent to us containing national but not local members. We would also like a master list plus mailing labels of all Detroit area national members.
- When supporting the MAA Career Fair we received ASA brochures to hand out that were related to statistics as a profession. There was a lack of concrete information on fields of application or where the jobs are for persons with statistics degrees.
- Change Videotapes of short courses to VHS. The 3/4" equipment is expensive to rent and hard to find.

Of the 73 active chapters responding, 18 indicated that they did not use videotapes. However, they all indicated that they would use them if more were filmed at the Joint Statistical Meetings. Other responses concerning the use of video tapes were:-

- don't know whether we would use them
- perhaps we would use them
- depends on availability of money
- depends on cost/time

Areas in Which Help is Needed

Responding chapters were asked to indicate any areas in which they needed help. The specified areas in which responding chapters needed help are summarized below.

Additional areas in which chapters indicated they needed help are provided below verbatim;

- Putting together high quality programs is difficult. In the past we have used video short courses successfully.
- Statistical courses.
- 1992 was a slow year we need self-improvement.
- We're always open to new ideas and input but since most of our members are in academics, and since budgets are too small to do much, we let the University provide speakers, courses, etc. Geographically we are too spread out to meet often.
- Needs a secretary with time to commit to these important areas.
- If we conduct another Quantitative literacy Conference, we will need financial assistance.
- Mailing list computerized for chapter.
- Chapter organizations, roles of officers.
- More videotapes of short courses.
- More timely mailing and communication from ASA office.
- Our big problem is geography it's 9 or 10 hours to drive between the 2 major concentrations of members. There's no help for that.
- I need to be more involved in energizing the chapter.
- Leadership training
- How to encourage holding of office and participation of members.
- Recruiting new members for leadership positions.

Issues of Importance not Addressed by ASA

Chapters were asked to indicate any issues of importance that have not been addressed by ASA. The following is a list (verbatim) of the chapters' responses.

- Several WSS members have expressed interest and concern about certification of statisticians. A local presentation would be helpful.
- Let's get the journals readable again. Does JASA really have to look like Annals?
- Greater emphasis on applied side.
- Our chapter has identified as one of its important factions the facilitation of networking among Bay Area statisticians; how about reorganizing the listing of people by chapter rather than town in the back of the directory?
- Suggest that an additional category be added to C2. Consider adding: Outreach Programs or Adopt-a-School Program.
- The big problem here is too few people to work, mostly without leadership experience or training. More than half the Chapter's leaders have left town, temporarily or permanently, in the past 2 years. WTASA can't get academics and industry people together. ASQC seems much more effective in aiding chapter.

We also suffer from leadership burnout. Our presidents have generally served for about 3 years, then quit with no successor trained. Meanwhile other people get tired of waiting and drop out.

- There should be a task force to review chapter with a largely academic membership. These chapters tend to be less active and consider that national office to be a nuisance at times. The ASA needs to recognize that these chapters are fundamentally different, and perhaps develop new and innovative programs for them.
- The expanded role of the chapter, if ASA certification becomes a reality.
- Please publish a formal timetable for requests for chapter information, ie., surveys, status reports, treasurer's report, etc.
- Involvement of non-academic people.

Methods of communication

Of the responding chapters, 97% used postal mailings, 45% used E-mail, 70% used the telephone, 42% used newsletters, and 15% used fax. 3% used other ways of communication. These ways include:

- Announcements at university and govn't lectures and on bulletin boards.
- A local telephone that gives details of the upcoming meetings.
